Name:	John Charles
Date and place of birth:	27 December1931, Swansea, South Wales
Date of death:	21 February 2004
Why is the person famous:	John Charles was a footballer who played for Leeds United, Juventus and Wales. According to some, he was one of the finest footballers raised in Wales in the twentieth century.
Highlights:	<ul> <li>1931: Born John Charles at 19 Alice Street, Cwmbwrla, Swansea</li> <li>1945: Leaves school at 14 years of age and joins Swansea football club.</li> <li>1948: Joined Leeds United football club at 17 years of age. He scored 150 goals in 9 seasons.</li> <li>1950: Plays for Wales for the first time.</li> <li>1957: Joined Italian club Juventus for a British record fee of £65,000.</li> <li>1958: Reaches the quarter-finals of the World Cup with Wales.</li> <li>1959: Comes third in the Ballon d'Or.</li> <li>1962: Leaves Juventus as a hero after scoring 108 goals in 155 games.</li> <li>1962: Played for Leeds, Roma and Cardiff over 4 years.</li> <li>2004: Dies at Pinderfields Hospital, Wakefield.</li> </ul>
Quotation:	"John Charles was a remarkably gifted footballer. He was blessed with an extremely powerful body. He stood at 6' 2" and weighed 14 stone. He could kick a ball powerfully and accurately with both feet, dribble nimbly, leap like a salmon and tackle forcefully. Throughout his glittering career no referee ever had cause to caution him, let alone send him off, he is known by all as 'The Gentle Giant' (II Buon Gigante)."  Professor Geraint Jenkins
