1. The Oracy Gap



On entry to school, disadvantaged children's spoken language development is significantly lower than their more advantaged peers.

19 months

Gap between the language skills of five year olds in the lowest and highest income groups (quintiles).

Without intervention, these gaps grow, as pupils with the strongest language skills make the most progress in all areas of the school curriculum.

2x as likely

Pupils receiving FSM are 1.6 times more likely to be below language expectations at age 5, compared to their non-FSM peers. This gap grows to twice as likely to be below language expectations at age 11.

Oracy improves academic outcomes developing learners who can think critically, reason together and have the vocabulary to express their knowledge and understanding



On average, pupils who participate in oral language interventions make approximately five months' additional progress over the course of a year.

Oracy fosters wellbeing

supporting students to build successful relationships, talk through issues, express feelings and resolve conflicts

3. Teaching Oracy

Teaching oracy

- Explicit teaching of oracy supports ALL students, but particularly those whose oracy skills are under-developed.
- Oracy-rich classrooms and schools model high quality spoken communication as well as giving students the opportunity to learn and practice their own oracy skills.
- We need to demystify the teaching of oracy:
- 1. Break oracy down into a concrete, teachable set of skills.
- 2. Break the teaching of oracy down into clear strategies and approaches.

4. Case Study

Bishop Young Academy

- Oracy has been at the heart of their school approach since 2018.
- Whole school approach: CPD, PD targets, the Bishop Character Curriculum, oracy in every subject, oral assessments in place of written assessments.

The impact:

- The attainment gap between economically disadvantaged students and their peers has closed.
- 94% of pupils feel the focus on oracy has helped them make better progress.
- Improved oracy has supported students to articulate themselves better, improving behaviour and supporting the resolution of conflict.





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
